The Voters Guide is funded and published by the League of Women Voters of Dallas. The League of Women Voters is a non-partisan organization whose mission is to promote political responsibility through the informed participation of all citizens in their government. The League of Women Voters does not support or oppose any candidate or political party.

Texas law allows you to carry this Voters Guide inside the voting booth.

The Voters Guide lists nearly all candidates who will appear on the ballot in Dallas County. Questionnaires were not sent to write-in or unopposed candidates or to a few for whom contact information was not available. Candidate replies are not edited or verified for accuracy. Candidates appearing with no photo did not submit one.

Candidate data for state and district level candidates was collected by the League of Women Voters of Texas. All other candidate data contained herein was collected by the League of Women Voters of Dallas unless otherwise noted.

Eligibility for Voting

You must be a citizen of the United States, registered to vote in the county of your residence 30 days prior to election day, and must be at least 18 years old on election day. You cannot vote if you have been declared by a court exercising probate jurisdiction to be totally mentally incapacitated or partially mentally incapacitated without the right to vote or are a convicted felon who has not completed your sentence, probation and/or parole.

Photo ID Requirement

The seven acceptable forms of photo identification for people voting in person are:

- * Texas driver license issued by Texas DPS
- * Texas personal identification card issued by Texas DPS

- * Texas concealed handgun license issued by Texas DPS
- * Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by Texas DPS
- * US military identification card containing the person's photograph
- * US passport
- * US citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph

With the exception of the US citizenship certificate, the identification for voters aged 18-69 must be current or have expired no more than 4 years before being presented. For voters 70 or older, the identification may be expired for any length of time.

The name on the photo ID and the name on the voter record must be the same or substantially similar.

Here are the supporting forms of ID that can be presented if the voter does not possess one of the IDs listed above and cannot obtain one due to a reasonable impediment. After presenting a supporting form of ID, the voter must execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration:

- Copy or original of a government document that shows the voter's name and an address, including the voter's voter registration certificate;
- * Copy of or original current utility bill;
- * Copy of or original bank statement;
- * Copy of or original government check;
- * Copy of or original paycheck; or
- * Copy of or original of (a) a certified domestic (from a US state or territory) birth certificate or (b) a document confirming birth admissible in a court of law which establishes the voter's identity (which may include a foreign birth document).

If a voter does not present the acceptable identification, he or she will still be permitted to vote provisionally. The voter will have six days to present acceptable identification to the Dallas County voter registrar for the provisional ballot to be accepted.

Polling Place Locations

Voters registered in Dallas County may vote in person at any of the Dallas County polling locations during early voting and on election day. "Dallas County Votes Anywhere"

The Dallas County Elections Department has changed the way voting takes place in Dallas County. Voters now cast their ballots on new voting equipment and can vote at countywide Vote Centers on election day similar to the way have the option to vote at their neighborhood Voter Center or at a Vote Center near where they work, shop or go to school. This program is called "Dallas County Votes Anywhere"

During early voting, Dallas County voters continue to have the option to vote at any convenient location in Dallas County, as they have in the past

Early Voting by Mail

Because of changes enacted by the state legislature in 2021, it is important that voters applying for mail ballots not use application forms issued before 2022. The new forms for use after 2021 ask applicants to provide additional identification. We recommend applicants provide BOTH a Texas Driver's Li cense or Texas Personal Identification Number AND the last four digits of their social security number on the new application form.

The completed application form must be RECEIVED (not postmarked) by Dallas County Elections Department no later than Friday February 18, 2022.

If eligible to vote by mail you may request either a Republican or a Democratic ballot for the Primary.

- You are eligible to vote early by mail if you are a registered voter who is:
- * 65 years of age or older on Election Day
- * Disabled (as defined by the Texas Election Code 82.002(a))
- * Expected to give birth within three weeks before or after Election Day
- * Civilly committed under 841, Health and Safety Code
- Out of the county during the entire election including early voting
- Confined in jail or involuntary Civil Commitment
- * Part of the Attorney General Address Confidentiality Program

If you are voting by mail because you are disabled or are 65 years of age or older, you may use a single application to request ballots by mail for all county elections in the calendar year.

- Once you have received and marked your ballot it can be returned.
- If hand delivered or if delivered by a common or contract carrier without a delivery receipt, it must be RECEIVED by the early voting clerk by 7 p.m. on election day.
- If mailed and postmarked by 7 p.m. on election day or delivered by common or contract carrier and accompanied by a delivery receipt showing the voter submitted the ballot for delivery by 7 p.m. on election day, it must ARRIVE by 5 p.m. on the next business day after election day.

Provisional Voting

Provisional voting is designed to allow a voter to vote (1) whose name does not appear on the list of registered voters due to an administrative error or (2) who does not show an acceptable form of ID when voting in person or (3) who re-ceived a mail ballot but goes to vote in person and does not surrender the mail ballot at the polls. The provisional voting process involves an affidavit that the voter must complete stating the reasons he or she is qualified to vote.

A voter can visit the Voter Registrar's office within six calendar dates of the date of the election to "cure" the reason the ballot cast was provisional and not a regular ballot. Detail on this process can be found at the Texas Secretary of State's website at www.VoteTexas.gov/faq/. If cured, the provisional ballot will count.

The voter-marked provisional ballots are kept separate from the regular ballots, and the voter's records will be reviewed by the provisional voting ballot board (the early voting ballot board), to determine if the ballot is to be counted or reconcerning ballot board), to determine if the ballot is to be counted or re-jected. Provisional voters will receive a notice in the mail by the 10th day after the local canvass advising them if their provisional ballots were counted, and if they were not counted, the reason why. Limited Ballot Option

If you have moved to a new Texas county and have not re-registered in the new county by the January 31, 2022 voter registration deadline, you may be eligible to vote a limited ballot in your new county. A limited ballot means that you would be allowed to vote on any candidates and measures in common be-tween your former and new county. This procedure is only available during the early voting period at the main early voting polling place (which is the George L Allen Sr Courts Bldg – Main Lobby, 600 Commerce St in Dallas). You may NOT vote a limited ballot on election day.

PARTISAN DIVISION: Legislation and other action often stalls along partisan lines. What would you do to foster more cooperation and less partisan competition in Washington for the good of the nation? HEALTHCARE: What legislation would you support, if any, to ensure comprehensive affordable healthcare for all? Include consideration of prescription drug costs.

INCOME TAXES: How would you rate our current income tax code? Do you believe we need to increase tax rates on very high income individuals or on large businesses? What other changes should we make? VOTING RIGHTS: Do you think Congress should enact additional

safeguards to protect voting rights and, if so, what safeguards would you enact?

COVID MANDATES: What do you think are the responsibilities of the US Government for mitigating the spread of dangerous infectious diseases? Consider whether private or public sector entities should be allowed to mandate vaccinations and/or masks or whether states should be able to impose mandates or override federal mandates. Kathleen Cordelia Bailey (D) PARTISAN DIVISION: Moving legislation forward requires compromise. Compromise is best United States Representative, achieved by identifying key objectives that all sides can support, exercising civility, defining facts accepted by all sides, and assuring non-public negotiations. In today's world of instant media, there is too much competition amongst politicians for momentary limelight. In their rush

to make a splash, they often take positions publicly that are hard to reverse or use language that antagonizes those with whom they must negotiate. In short, we need more diplomats who are willing to forgo rancor for the sake of progress. HEALTHCARE: A great deal of progress on comprehensive affordable healthcare has been made since the Affordable Care Act was

enacted. Large sums of money have been allocated to ensuring that Americans have access to this healthcare. It is time to assess lessons learned from the recent progress before undertaking further large-scale measures. But the one area in which there is urgent need is prescription drug costs. One idea that makes sense to me is to allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices for seniors.

INCOME TAXES: Our current income tax code is in serious need of overhaul. I strongly support equalizing tax rates for capital gains and ordinary income. I would work to ensure that incomes over \$1 million face a minimum 30% tax and I would work to close the carried interest loophole that lets fund managers avoid billions of dollars in taxes.

VOTING RIGHTS: I support enacting the Freedom to Vote Act (or similar legislation) to accomplish the safeguards I believe to be imperative. Regarding election administration, we need: an end to partisan gerrymandering, federal minimum standards on vote-by-mail and drop boxes, and voter list maintenance standards. And it is crucial that we ensure election integrity by: insulating non-partisan elections officials from interference or control, verification of ballots and voting system to ensure credible audits, non-partisan election officials, and voting security protections against cyber and other threats.

COVID MANDATES: The responsibilities of the US government have been well identified during the Covid pandemic--facilitating vaccine & testing development and distribution. Lessons learned from this event will be a good guide for any future infectious disease outbreak. While I believe that it should be the right of businesses and companies to require vaccinations and or masks, I do not believe that governments should be able to require vaccinations state- or nationwide. Masks however are different and should be mandated as needed.


OTHER ISSUES: There are two issues that I view as extremely pressing: the growth of homegrown terrorists and hate groups, and the threats to our election processes and vote counting. My position is that we must do more to tamp down the disinformation and conspiracy theories that drive hate groups, and this must begin with controls on social media. As for elections integrity, we must pass measures to ensure non-partisan districts and vote counting, as well as clean up the electoral college voting process

PARTISAN DIVISION: Many people are saying our country is heading toward a civil war. I dis-United States Representative, agree. What we do have however is an "uncivil war." It has become in vogue for many in congress to hurl insults at one another on social media. I have spent the last 27 years working in the conflict resolution field helping people resolve conflicts. Learning to communicate with less abrasive

language is key. If the American people demand that our leaders engage with one another on a respectful level or be voted out of office, we will greatly improve the chances that work will finally get done in Washington.

HEALTHCARE: Hard working Americans should not be one hernia away from bankruptcy. Deductibles of \$7,000 are becoming the norm for private plans and the possibility of surprise "out of network" coverage denials are not uncommon. I support Pete Buttigieg's plan of "Medicare for Those Who Want It." Right now, Big Pharma and insurance lobbies have been allowed too many seats at the table. Profit is defining our policies. The government should definitely become involved in controlling drug prices. Why does a commonly prescribed diabetes drug cost Canadians \$371, while the same drug costs us \$1,355?

INCOME TAXES: Our income tax code is overly complex and favors the very wealthy. The average American does not have a lobbyist contributing to political campaigns. Billionaire Warren Buffet once told us that he pays a tax rate of 17.7% while the average worker in his office pays a rate of 32.9%. A lobby-free overhaul of our tax code is critical. Although everyone should have input, the average American should not be shouldering the burden of running this country, while big corporations shelter money in off-shore havens and pay less than their fair share.

VOTING RIGHTS: The United States has historically been looked to help emerging nations set up a Democratic process. Unfortunately, our own democracy is at risk right now as states pass laws that restrict voter rights. In Texas for example, over half of new voter registration applications have been declared invalid under the rules recently passed by our legislature. Challenging election results has become a sport. We must pass the voter rights legislation that is currently before congress and we must enact laws that make false claims about election fraud a crime.

COVID MANDATES: Opinion on vaccines has changed as they have now been proven to be less effective against transmission of the new strains of Covid-19. We have a shortage of doctors and nurses in our country. Because PPE and testing is available daily, we should reconsider the stance on their termination. Masks have proven to reduce transmission and the mass production of accurate tests should be a priority. Mandates have divided our country and have pit employees against their employer. The federal government must lead in disease control but information about drug efficacy should be factored into mandates.

OTHER ISSUES: The new vigilante abortion law passed in Texas is metastasizing throughout our country. Under this law, even a woman who has been raped can be sued for \$10,000 if they terminate their pregnancy after six weeks. To go back in time when a woman had to resort to back-alley medi-cine for help is unacceptable. Immigration laws need to be simplified and enforced. We have 10.5 million jobs open in this country and millions of immigrants who can do them but are unable to gain entry under a work permit. If we redesign and control work permits, we can fill important jobs and add to our tax base.

I do not think either party has a monopoly on good ideas, and I believe in working together for the common good of all North Texas families. The increased sophistication behind partisan gerrymandering has led to the near elimination of swing districts and has incentivized representatives to solely concentrate on their base for re-election. We need to pass the Voting Rights Act.

HEALTHCARE: I believe that Americans, regardless of which job they have or their income, should be entitled to affordable, quality health care - and that includes strong protections for women's health care. The first step to fixing our healthcare system should be to lower costs for all Texans, including lowering prescription drug costs for seniors. We also need to ensure that every Texan has access to quality, affordable care where they live, which means we need to support our community health facilities and rural hospitals. I will also oppose any cut to Medicare, and will work to lower eligibility age.

INCOME TAXES: Our tax system is unfortunately too complicated, and skews too much towards helping the billionaires and biggest corporations. I support ensuring that the biggest corporations pay their fair share, without stifling growth and innovation. I would also ensure that we unskew the tax code, in order to ensure middle class families are no longer the ones bearing the biggest burden from our tax code. America is at its strongest when we have a robust middle class and the middle class has been shrinking for decades. We need to continue our economic growth, but we need more equity in that growth

VOTING RIGHTS: I do believe we need to protect voting rights. Too many elected officials in Austin and in Washington have worked to make it harder to vote, not easier. With the gerrymandered map in my district, communities of color have been split up and their voice in the democratic process has been diluted. In Congress, I will work to make it easier for Americans to vote - not harder. The John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act needs to pass. I believe Americans should automatically be registered to vote when they turn 18 years old and that election day should be a national holiday. COVID MANDATES: As the parent of two young boys, I have had a firsthand view of how difficult this pandemic has been for parents across our country. We need to do better by working parents, and also ensure our hospitals are no longer overwhelmed with COVID patients. We need to increase our resources for testing as well. I believe employers and other organizations should have the right to implement mask and vaccine mandates for their employees, if they choose to do so, and am critical of our governor standing in the way of school districts seeking to protect our children. OTHER ISSUES: One of the biggest challenges we face is how we reemerge from this pandemic with a stronger, more equitable economy. Income inequality has been exacerbated by the pandemic and we need to get COVID under control. However, just returning our economy to where it was before the pandemic is not good enough. I previously worked the night shift in a South Dallas warehouse and while the city and the region have been seeing tremendous growth, many of the people I supervised were working two or even three jobs just to put food on the table for their children. PARTISAN DIVISION: I don't necessarily agree with the premise of this question, which suggests that "meeting in the middle" should be a goal. I do understand and agree that there are legitimate differences of opinion on almost every issue, with relevant arguments to be made for various possible approaches. I definitely agree that compromise and collaboration would be the

ideal. But those must begin from a shared set of facts. Therefore, I plan to lead by encouraging ongoing education and fact finding. I think the nation is always well served when our leaders acknowledge truth and speak truth to the people.

HEALTHCARE: I favor Medicare For All. Other nations have shown that universal healthcare works, producing better outcomes at lower costs. The Covid pandemic has highlighted the failings in our current system, where coverage is often tied to a person's job. Many people today work in the gig economy with no health coverage. Millions of others lost jobs as the pandemic began. Prescription drug costs must be affordable. Medicare must be able to negotiate the prices paid for the drugs just as private insurers do. The pharma lobbies must not have a louder voice than do the people needing those drugs.

INCOME TAXES: Our current income tax code scores low on both clarity and fairness. Recently, the very wealthy have seen their tax rates at their lowest point since the mid 1980s. In that same time, income and wealth inequality have ballooned to extraordinary rates. It seems abundantly clear that fairness would include an increased tax on both very wealthy individuals and on major corporations. I also advocate for an "income is income" approach, which would apply the same rules to both capital gains income and ordinary income. This would put into practice President Biden's vow to value work over wealth.

VOTING RIGHTS: The 2020 election was the most fair and secure in our history. Still, Republicans have been working to upend the system and allow partisans to overrule the votes of the people. That is unacceptable. The John Lewis Voting Rights Act and the Freedom to Vote Act are essential to our democ-racy. The 28th Amendment promoted by the group American Promise also tackles the problem of money in our elections. The issues are the ability of every eligible citizen to vote, the integrity of the certification of the results, and the absence of partisan gerrymandering that makes elections noncompetitive. COVID MANDATES: Public health is a primary responsibility of our federal government. Although the Supreme Court has ruled that OSHA does not have the authority to mandate sciences in the workplace, Congress could pass legislation to make it a reality. Private businesses clearly have that right, as shown by "No shirt, no shoes, no service." Many businesses would likely prefer, though, to have the weight of a governmental mandate to back them up. When a state law is in conflict with a federal one, the federal statute prevails. That should surely be the case here, when almost a million lives have been lost. OTHER ISSUES: We absolutely must address climate change as the "house on fire" emergency that it is. Renewable energy sources are the answer. Subsidies should be provided to encourage research and development on the storage and transmission issues that are currently the weak links in the system. Americans should receive tax credits for energy efficient improvements such as solar panels and electric cars. And fossil fuel companies, which have been making record profits while they drive our planet toward the ultimate cliff, must not get any further government supports or subsidies. PARTISAN DIVISION: The division in our country is being fueled by politicians being bought by United States Representative, corporations at the cost of our communities. NAFTA was a "bipartisan" piece of legislation that directly hurt the workers in our community. What does a "bipartisan" victory mean when we outsource American jobs? My leadership will be pro-people and pro-justice, because what the people want is someone who will be unafraid to challenge such bills. In Congress, I will hold my colleagues accountable from voting against the

interests of our communities under the guise of "bipartisanship." **HEALTHCARE:** Our healthcare system is broken. My lung collapsed at the age of 7 because my mother couldn't afford my \$20 asthma medication. My district has some of the lowest life expectancies in the United States. In Congress, I will fight for Medicare for All. I also support the cur-rent healthcare reforms in the Build Back Better bill, including allowing Medicare to negotiate with drug manufacturers. Additionally, I support capping drug prices in the U.S. at the median price in other developed nations and allowing patients, pharmacists, and wholesalers to import safe, affordable medicine from Canada.

INCOME TAXES: It is time the wealthy pay their fair share of taxes. It is unacceptable that companies like Nike and Amazon continue to pay zero in federal income tax year after year. We must also tax the net worth of individuals worth \$50 million or more in this country. Taxing just "income" is not enough. Many multi-millionaires and billionaires circumvent paying income taxes because much of their wealth is held in stock and real estate, which isn't considered taxable unless those assets are sold and are also taxed at a lower rate than ordinary income.

VOTING RIGHTS: Congress must pass the For The People Act, the John Lewis Voting Rights Act, and overturn the Citizens United v. FEC ruling. Along with voting rights reform, we must make reforms to restore voters' faith in their elected officials. A lot of this disillusionment comes from the fact both parties are accepting corporate PAC and dark money. My campaign is 100% grassroots. I am not accepting any corporate PAC money because my allegiance is to the people, not corporations or lobbyists. I also support banning members of Congress from trading stocks while in office and sitting on corporate boards

Our children must be able to ask tough questions and not be afraid of the answers. Sex education should be taught based on facts and science, because abstinence-only programs are ineffective.

LOCAL CONTROL: Local governments are best suited to address subjects related to property taxation, public safety budgeting, environmental controls and incentives, business incentives and COVID mandates. The state has been attempting to usurp local political interests though state legislation. This is wrong because local governments have a better understanding of what is best for their employees and their constituents. I do believe that local governments should work responsibly to assure that communities do not end up with a patchwork of requirements that confuses

GUN RIGHTS: While I recognize that the Second Amendment confers rights to citizens, gun rights cannot be considered without also considering the responsibili-ties of gun ownership. I believe that the "constitutional carry" bill should be repealed, and Texans carrying guns should be required to demonstrate that they are responsible gun owners. I also support universal background check and red flag laws. I am deeply concerned about the proliferation of guns and gun violence in our community and its impact on our public health, and I believe that a reasonable legislative response is appropriate.

VOTING MODERNIZATION: Our democracy depends on higher voter participation. I support efforts to make voting easier such as simplified registration including online registration, same-day voter registration with a provisional ballot, wider and simplified use of vote by mail, and local flexibility to create solutions that fit the local community needs in order to make voting accessible such as drive-through voting and extended hours. Additionally, higher voter participation can be achieved by ranked-choice or approval voting. This would eliminate run-offs, reduce costs, and decrease the number of elections.

ELECTRICAL GRID: The legislature passed laws related to weatherization and natural gas supplies, although there were loopholes that must be closed. We should also consider joining with other surrounding power grids to assure dependability. Long term, alternate energy supplies made possible by new technologies such as wind power with improved battery potential, could address a part of the problem. Under the current system, the cost of failure is borne by consumers and consumer representation must be the focus of future reform. We also must investigate manipulation of the natural gas market during a disaster.

OTHER ISSUES: We must reclaim womens' rights to control their reproductive health, and expand all Texans' access to quality, affordable healthcare. This includes securing the right to access birth control and abortion, expanding Medicaid coverage, and developing a science-based response to the pandemic. The legislature

must address the long term impact of this pandemic, including the health and education crisis when teachers and first responders choose to leave their professions. The State Legislature should not be politicizing our children's education. We need to work on repealing the "CRT" Education bills & allow teachers to teach factual & historical representations of our Texas & United States History. Further, the State Legis lature should rely on advocacy groups & evidence-based sexual education programs (which also include abstinence messages) that have been oven to reduce teen births.

LOCAL CONTROL: The State should respect the local control of school districts & city & county governments. These governmental entities are often the levels of government closest to the people & they are critical in designing solutions that benefit their community & reflect their priorities.

Our infrastructure needs a lot of updating as well. Our pre-trial release division has 15 people managing all of the defendants on bond who are being monitored on ELM, GPS ELM in domestic violence cases, and on alcohol monitoring for all 30 criminal courts. That is just not enough people. Only 40% of the Dallas County probation department is funded by the State. The other 60% of the funding comes from the fees the probationers pay themselves. We need help. **OTHER ISSUES:** This court needs a Judge to who can effectively run the docket. There is a large back log of cases in this court. I would first review the jail cases and make sure that no one is sitting in jail in who could be released with conditions of bond. I would discuss the probation cases to find out who is in need of particularized treatment and see that s/he gets it. I assisted in the development and implementation of policies and procedures during the pandemic to insure public access to the Courts. We were able to transition from in person hearings to remote hearings without losing productivity during this critical time.

PERFORMANCE & EXPERTISE: Prior to my judicial tenure, my practice included state and federal litigation, including Title VII cases. I also had a productive mediation practice. After being certified to conduct family and child welfare mediations, I was sought by my colleagues to assist in difficult and complex termination cases. The mediation practice helped me understand how meaningful it was to move these cases off the Court's docket. The 330th utilizes private mediators to assist in the movement of its docket. I have not had a public reprimand nor a suspension.

ACCESS TO JUSTICE: The 330th conducts pro sè dockets four (4) times a month. We see approximately 50 - 60 litigants during these dockets. We take the time to read their pleadings for deficiencies and have developed a host of resources for them if we determine that they are unable to navigate the legal system without some type of professional help. We have streamlined the process for them, especially on non-contested divorces.

NUMBER OF COURTS: The 330th District Court as well as the 6 other family district courts maintains an active caseload of about 3600-3900 cases each year. On average, the 330th disposes of 350-390 cases each month. We run a specialized docket to move cases that sit for 90 -120 days without activity. This pushes most cases to trial within 16-18 months. On more complicated matters, it may take slightly longer. I do not believe it is possible or prudent to move a case through the process much quicker than where we are currently targeting. In my humble opinion, the current number of courts and judges are fine. OTHER ISSUES: The next pressing issue for the court will be to re-imagine how we conduct hearings post pandemic. Since we have been handling full dock-ets remotely, we have determined that we may be able to streamline some of the motion dockets. Trials should most definitely be handled in-person for pragmatic reasons, however, it will take some buy-in from the bar to change course once again. I am hopeful that adjusting the dockets again will have the benefit of saving time and money for the litigants

IMPROVEMENTS: Goals: 1) Lead by example; 2) Train a new generation of prosecutors who distinguish violent from non-violent criminals; 3) Engaging all sectors of the community in establishing goals and values for the office; 4) Bail reform to reduce jail costs; 5) Improving and establishing innovative diversion programs to save lives and money; 6) Expanding access to mental health services to reduce crime; 7) Improv-ing conviction integrity; 8) Expanding efforts to release innocent individuals from prison; 9) Commensense approaches to low-level offenses.

PREVENTION: My office is focused on violent and serious crime and keeping our community safe, while introducing reforms that help people, save money, and free up resources to address major crime. For example, I spearheaded the DALLAS DEFLECTS program to give the homeless and mentally ill wraparound services, rather than incarcerating them and placing an undue burden on a jail system that is not equipped to properly help these individuals. We have also stopped prosecuting low-level offenses, such as possession of marijuana for personal use. These ideas free up law enforcement to address serious crime. BAIL SYSTEM REFORM: We need a bail system that does not reward people based on their ability to pay. The current system in many cases makes it possible for those with means to make bail regardless of their level of flight risk. At the same time, people who are struggling economically who many have done something minor, and who really do not pose a flight risk, are unable to make bail. These situations can be devastating to people who lose jobs, can't take care of children, or get in even more financial trouble. We need to place a fact-based risk assessment at the center of our bail system.

OTHER ISSUES: We have done a lot of good work (diversion programs for select first-time offenders, new programs to help people who need treatment instead of jail, improving conviction integrity, freeing innocent persons) to improve the efficacy of our system and reduce mass incarceration. In my next term, I intend to focus not only on bail reform, but also on probation reform so that we can address "mass surveillance" of people who are self-correcting. I intend to continue trying and evaluating ways for the justice system to be fair and equitable and to be focused on outcomes - especially keeping us safer. It allows prosecutors to use preemptory strikes against potential jurors to ensure they do not serve on juries in the future. Courthouse lawyers nicknamed it the "Bad Juror List." The District Attorney's Office can expand opportunities for all Dallas County residents by eliminating this system of strikes.

PREVENTION: Violent crime is one of the greatest public safety concerns in Dallas County. It should be addressed by focusing on family violence, repeat violent offenders, and human trafficking

BAIL SYSTEM REFORM: We should have 24/7 criminal defense lawyers, prosecutors, and Judges available to conduct bond hearings throughout the day and night at the jail to determine whether defendants should be released or held. Defendants who are held will have a right to have their bond decision reviewed

Our healthcare providers are exhausted to a critical point. The increase in provider contract could help fight the pandemic surge and transition to supporting other medical needs other than pandemic support. -I would decrease spending in county vehicle purchases. MANAGING THE PANDEMIC: I disagree. My changes would have started with a massive education program. The vaccination program has been met with much resistance due to lack of official info. regarding the various vaccine options. I would have ensured that the vaccine roll-

out would have included county-led mobile teams to target the community with information and actual vaccine. I would target those identified in the "vulnerable" zip codes through support from actual members of said community. I would NEVER encourage giving away monetary gifts as part of encouraging vaccination. The message should be public health. VOTING: Our voting process should always be one which is based on widespread availability and security control of the process. I would encourage more

support of the voting process again through proactive information. NUMBER OF COURTS: The Office of Court Administration, tasked with determining future court needs, has already projected that Dallas County will require additional civil courts to ensure that caseloads remain manageable. Dallas County has two kinds of civil courts; district courts and county courts. Both types of courts have identical jurisdiction to handle cases of the same size and complexity. It is not currently known if additional county or district courts will be added. Until additional courts are added, one way to address future needs would be to utilize visiting judges if and when the needed. OTHER ISSUES: Maintaining efficiency while ensuring due process is always a careful balancing act that requires constant attention. I listen to the parties and their needs in each case in order to give them the attention their case requires. I value their time and that of the jurors, and discourage undue delays. The remote court proceedings developed in 2020 have been well received and very successful. I believe that such proceedings have improved efficiency and ease of access to the court. Election contest lawsuits are being used by Republicans to undermine public confidence in what are demonstrably free and fair elections. I successfully defended Adam Bazaldua in one of these frivolous contests and saw the corruption first hand. The county's Elections Department must be turned into a bulwark against the unprecedented Republican attacks on the franchise and a proactive registration program.

HOMELESSNESS: I want the county to shift its resources toward rapid rehousing in partnership with the cities in the county. But the county also should invest in affordable housing because the severe spike in homelessness is directly tied to the lack of affordable housing in the county. One program I want the county to participate in is the sublease program from the City of Dallas's Comprehensive Housing Plan (that I helped write). Small incentives to get infill landlords to accept vouchers is the fastest way to get a couple of thousand voucher holders housed. As a certified voucher landlord, I can help.

OTHER ISSUES: Jobs. The county has inadequate job growth and inadequate wage growth within the existing job base. The county should not be in the business of direct subsidies such as with the disastrous Uber incentive package, but it can be a very effective economic development partner to the cities in the county by investing in the infrastructure allowing cities to attract employers and grow existing employers.

The County Commissioner's Court has decided to implement an updated software system, but it has not been rolled out yet to JP Court.

ACCESSIBILITY: In 2019, our office launched night court. We are open the first and third Tuesdays of the month until 7 pm so people can take care of their legal matters after normal business hours. We are currently the only JP court with this schedule. I also implemented mediation for civil cases so cases could be settled out of court. This saves litigants money and time instead of proceeding with

trial. We have also partnered with other local courts to host virtual hearings so people can appear virtually from a court closer to their homes instead of driving to Grand Prairie for an in-person hearing.

EVICTIONS: Eviction cases have been hit especially hard due to the pandemic. The federal, state and local eviction laws are constantly changing. I've held numerous virtual forums to inform landlords and tenants of the latest changes so they are aware of their rights. My court also sends out rent relief resources with every citation. We also have a Dallas County Housing Liaison and Legal Aid of NorthWest Texas on-site to assist tenants when they arrive to court for their hearings. While we can't stop evictions, we can provide resources to assist individuals during this difficult time.

OTHER ISSUES: It's been a difficult few years for the JP courts due to the pandemic. Most individuals represent themselves and do not have attorneys. Unfortunately, our courts do not have a permanent e-filing system in place so most individuals file their legal documents in-person or via mail. People also have limited access to technology making virtual video hearings difficult to proceed with. 

I clerked for the Chief Judge of the 5th Circuit, led a major appellate practice at Jones Day, am broad certified David J. Schenck (R) Justice, Supreme Court, Place 9 in civil appellate law, and chair the commission on judicial conduct.

STANDARDS: The positive is that the candidate at least have some demonstrable minimal competence and lack of actual record of corruption. It does not, however, require any judicial service experience or address the more critical problems with the initial selection and appointment, which is the manner by which the vast majority of appellate judges initially come to the bench.

ETHICS: At present, voters are not assured of this and the appearance that donations affect rulings has been demonstrated repeatedly without any meaningful effort at reform—making this issue most critical. OTHER ISSUES: Until the foregoing is resolved, there is very little of significance that the Court can achieve. Judicial decisions are followed only because —

EQUITY: Ensuring open courts is fundamental to public confidence in our judiciary and to protecting individual rights. The Access to Justice

Commission, Texas Legislature, and Texas Supreme Court have made great progress in marshaling public and private support for expanded representation of underprivileged Texans and making judicial proceedings more efficient and comprehensible. ETHICS: That risk diminishes when judges have a sound, stable method of judicial decision-making, like Justice Scalia's. Their analysis can be tested, in case

after case, for rigor and consistency. Judges must hold themselves and each other accountable, too. I make the same promise to those who support me and those who don't: I will follow the law wherever it goes in every case.

OTHER ISSUES: Among the most pressing work for the Supreme Court will be ensuring, even in times of crisis, and without fear or favor, that the limitations of the U.S. and Texas Constitutions are respected—the lines between different branches of government, between the state and local governments, and between government power and individual liberty.

We must punish those who prey on the underserved as harshly as we punish other criminals. Everyone should have the opportunity to live in safety. As a judge, I will treat all who appear before me equally and fairly.

ETHICS: The only way to elect an honest judiciary is for voters to learn about the candidates and elect men and women with integrity. Every system of judicial selection is vulnerable to corrupt behavior, and judges can be corrupted by forces outside the selection process. One advantage of an elected judiciary is that voters can remove judges who seem corrupt.

I would support a temporary change in the STAAR testing, making it solely diagnostic thus removing the report card pressure.

OTHER ISSUES: School safety concerns me greatly. Much volatility is resulting from bullying situations. I think that building a more secure sense of community and respect for all students might be something that could be folded into the soon to be revised Social Studies TEKS.

Currently, law enforcement officers wait 4 or more hours to process a suspect, which are 4 or more hours that they are not serving and protecting. MANAGING THE PANDEMIC: I disagree. A recent headline in the Dallas Morning News sums up the county's response to the pandemic,

"Rocky start: COVID-19 tests now by appointment only at Dallas' Ellis Davis Field House". It is unconscionable that after 96 weeks from the beginning of the pandemic we still have "rocky starts". The vaccine rollout was a fiasco, with friends of the judge being given immediate access to the vaccine, while those that needed the vaccine (high-risk individuals) had to wait days or weeks. We had to travel to Canton for my vaccine, as none

were available in Dallas County. VOTING: We need to make it easy to vote, and hard to cheat. Recent legislation will help on both those accounts, however, we need to make the entire system for voting is more efficient. We need an external audit of the security systems and the implementation of those recommendations. The access to infor-

mation about voting has improved, but the website needs significant upgrades to make it easier to navigate. HOMELESSNESS: We need to work together with various cities in the county, and non-profit organizations, to enhance the private-public partnerships that help the homeless, including better access to health care at Parkland. For example, in Dallas ISD, we partner with religious, non-profit, and philanthropic organizations to provide housing for homeless students, unfortunately, as a percentage, the fastest-growing demographic of students. These have helped students graduate and enter the workforce.

OTHER ISSUES: To start, I would fix the typos in the jury applicant intake system. With the overwhelming majority of the caseload in JP Courts being evictions, I believe I am uniquely qualified. Adding to my Real Estate background I have 10 in local public office. ACCESSIBILITY: The Courts and/or it's offices should be accessible a minimum of 6 hours a day to the public to allow for all needed Court filings as well as the ability of the public to be able to ask questions of Court staff. I would look into an enhanced website with more FAQ's

so the public can have a better understanding of what they can and cannot do in a Justice of the Peace Court. While the JP Courts are the People's Court, the Judge and/or Court staff cannot give either party any legal advice. There is Legal aid available to those who qualify and who most needs these services

EVICTIONS: The law is very specific in how the eviction process is to be conducted and leaves very little up to the discretion of the Court. Should the losing party feel wronged in the JP Court they always have the legal right to appeal to a higher Court of Law in Dallas County. The JP Courts should always be considered and held up to the Ideal of "Equal Justice for All".

OTHER ISSUES: Justices of the Peace should have better and more detailed training in handling and deciding cases in the "Small Claims Court" under their responsibility. With the ongoing National health issues it is incumbent on all the Courts in Dallas County to do all they can to assure safety to the public and remain open to the public as much as feasibly possible. Communicating with the public is key and they must know that the Justice of the Peace Court is their Court and that the JP's are there to serve them whenever possible.

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
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
Dallas County Commissioners District Map



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
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Congressional District Map




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Justice of the Peace Precinct Map




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State Board of Education Map
